A SCOUT'S COOKING CAULIFLOWER FRIED RICE WITH BACON RECIPE



INGREDIENTS

4 slices bacon, chopped

1 small onion, finely minced

1 head cauliflower, grated

1 tablespoon water

1 cup frozen mixed vegetables

1 tablespoon fish sauce or soy sauce

DIRECTIONS

STEP 1: In a wok or large sauté pan over medium heat, cook bacon until almost crispy.

STEP 2: Add the onions and stir fry until trans-

STEP 3: Turn heat to high. Add the grated cauliflower and stir fry for 1 minute. Add water and mixed vegetables, stir well, cover the pan and let the cauliflower mixture steam for another 3 minutes or until tender.

STEP 4: Uncover and add (your choice of seasoning) to combine. Toss well. Taste and add additional seasoning as desired.

LIFE SCOUT TO EAGLE SCOUT

The Life scout takes a wonderful journey to become an Eagle Scout. It begins by making a commitment to becoming a better person; one who is willing to serve others in as many ways as possible. Yes, service is what scouting is about. Just like being a priesthood holder. The skills a scout learns during his few years in scouting will not only make him a skilled person, it will make him a person of value to others.

There is a great deal necessary to accomplish the task of achieving the rank of Eagle scout, all of which is to be done by the scout, with assistance from parents and leaders. Things like, transportation to acquire signatures from leaders that a scout may not be able to do on his own.

An Eagle candidate should download the Eagle workbook and application onto his computer and read through each in their entirety to become familiar with the information he will need to gather in order to complete each of these. There are many things required to complete the workbook. It is divided into 3 sections: The project proposal, the project plan, and the project report. Each section requires signatures from leaders or others. Some projects will require fundraising. This has to be done

by scouting requirements and documented.

Accomplishing the requirements for Eagle rank is not like earning a merit badge. It is not something that can be done in a weekend, or even two weekends. The Eagle candidate must complete each section of the workbook, which requires much information, getting signatures and dates, before moving onto actually doing the project. The project itself may be able to be done in a few days, but the workbook will take months. It is not something that should or can be taken lightly. The workbook outlines the whole project and the process to complete it. The Eagle Scout Board will need to be able to take the workbook, look at each entry, and retrace the steps the Eagle candidate took to accomplishing his project and the reason his project qualifies as an Eagle Scout Project. They will have questions for him at his Review, but they should be fully informed of what process he took and what he accomplished simply by reading his workbook

During the carrying out of the project, the Eagle candidate is to instruct and advise others how to accomplish his project. The project is not about what the scout can build or do, but ra-

ther, how he leads others.

One of the first things an Eagle candidate needs to do is select an Eagle Coach. Our troop has 4 trained Eagle Coaches; Gain Foster, John Oliver, Mike Bradshaw, and Patti Hobbs. The job of an Eagle Coach is to assist the boy with his Eagle project, in that, he/she makes sure the project the scout has chosen will pass the Eagle Board of Review. The Eagle Coach can answer questions, or get answers to questions concerning the carrying out of the project.

I recommend that the scout and his parents look at most if not all links and become as familiar with the information as they can in order to make this journey an easier one.

Because this is a long, involved journey, the Eagle candidate and his parents will feel a huge sense of accomplishment upon completion of it. They will know the sweet taste of success and reap the rewards for the rest of their lives.
